This quick reference checklist is designed to help employees and decision makers of commercial facilities, schools, etc. respond to a bomb threat in an orderly and controlled manner with the first responders and other stakeholders.	DATE: TIME:
Most bomb threats are received by phone. Bomb threats are serious until proven otherwise. Act quickly, but remain calm and obtain information with the checklist on this card.	TIME CALLER HUNG UP: PHONE NUMBER CALL WAS RECEIVED FROM:
If a bomb threat is received by phone:	ASK CALLER
<ol> <li>Remain calm. Keep the caller on the line for as long as possible. DO NOT HANG UP, even if the caller does.</li> <li>Listen carefully. Be polite and show interest.</li> <li>Try to keep the caller talking to learn more information.</li> <li>If possible, write a note to a colleague to call the authorities or, as soon as the caller hangs up, immediately notify them yourself.</li> <li>If your phone has a display, copy the number and/or letters on the window display.</li> <li>Complete the Bomb Threat Checklist immediately. Write down as much detail as you can remember. Try to get exact words.</li> <li>Immediately upon termination of call, DO NOT HANG UP, but from a different phone, contact authorities immediately with information and await instructions.</li> </ol>	Where is the bomb located?
